• Boise School District, Dennis Technical Education Center Industry Sector Grant

Dennis Technical Education Center (DTEC) will double the capacity of their welding program using this grant. Currently, the program is forced to turn away over 50% of interested students due to capacity limitations, and this expansion will both alleviate that limitation and allow the program to complete necessary updates. By purchasing new equipment and securing a dedicated instructor for the Welding III classes, this project will allow program graduates more time for hands-on practice and ensure that each student is equipped with the cuttingedge skills they need to succeed in a rapidly modernizing field.

Funding Requested \$325,972.00

- Project will fall under the STEM-Focused funding
- Boise School District is the applicant with the project taking place at Dennis Technical Education Center.
- 87% Consensus Score

• Boise State University Industry Sector Grant

This project will scale the training space available at Boise State University for BSU degree-seeking students, CWI and CSI technician students, and Chip Camp participants in grades 8-12. The project will triple clean room space, moving from 5 students to 15 at a time. This efficient, flexible space will allow students to gain proficiency on industry-relevant equipment and help to supply the 900 technicians and additional 900 engineers/scientists that will be needed in the Micron expansion. This project has the support of major regional semiconductor manufacturers and will collaborate with community colleges to ensure good access to training facilities for the community. Additionally, a reasonable plan exists to sustain the project beyond the lifespan of this grant using a combination of student fees and endowment funds.

Funding Requested \$1,759,695.01

Project will be funded through ARPA dollars
