Budget Update Wendi Secrist

- Review of first 4 months
- 29% spend, in line with expectations
- Nothing notable
- WDTF
 - o \$29.4M balance beginning of Nov., \$700K in revenue and interest received
 - Unobligated balance \$2.8M
 - Under review \$2.2M
 - Anticipate obligated Launch funding to be shifted due to participants not completing process
 - o Interest now being received every month
- WIOA
 - o Expense a little higher due to September Council meeting and salary
 - YARG spending is now closed
 - Close to dispersing all Launch grants with ARPA funds
 - Child Care all funds are obligated, some projects are starting to complete
 - Next report will reflect completed projects by color
 - Child Care funds must be dispersed by December 2026
- LAUNCH
 - More funds in operations than needed, legislature provided \$4M actual will likely be \$2.5 3M
 - Payments have begun to institutions

 - o Established 2015 by Idaho Code 67-823
 - How we get it done
 - STEM education Strategic partnerships
 - Community conversations facilitating connections
 - Innovative & promising practices in STEM
 - Idaho EcosySTEM sponsorship
 - Goals
 - Increase awareness
 - Increase pursuit of STEM pathways across Idaho
 - Align STEM and CS education with workforce needs
 - o Programs
 - Idaho Science & Engineering Fairs: 3 in Idaho & 1 International Fair in collaboration with the Idaho EcosySTEM; goal 90 student projects, at 70 currently mostly coming from East followed by West and then North Idaho
 - I-STEM: summer professional development opportunity for educators (PK-12) working in formal and informal settings focused on improving access to effective STEM learning opportunities in collaboration with industry; 442 participants in 2024, held throughout the state. WDC Grant provided some funding
 - Externship: places educators into workplace experiences during the summer months to bring these experiences back into the classroom. WDC Grant provided funding
 - STEM School Designation: established to serve as an indicator for parents and students looking for STEM school experiences in ID helping schools meet standards aligned with best practices to foster in-demand skills and competencies – 11 current participating
 - STEM Identity Scholarship: Seniors in an Idaho Public HS 2 4-year full tuition to a STEM related program at an Idaho
 - Computer Science legislation 500K of general funds must be used for Computer
 - EcosySTEM: STEM AC is founding member through its support of the Idaho STEM EcosySTEM STEM AC seeks to fulfill the several of the legislative requirements. The Idaho STEM EcosySTEM engages partners to foster transformative STEM learning
 - Fundraising
 - Individuals and companies can give dollars to the program
 - Stopped P3s in 2023
